#### Call to Order

Chair Sabol Soule called the meeting to order at 1:34 p.m.

#### **Acknowledgement of Media**

There was no press present.

#### **Approval of Agenda**

A motion was made to add verbiage on #11 to read, "and Glossary and Mandatory Adherence"; to change #17 to Review of CAC Charter; renumber in accordance to #17 addition.

The motion carried unanimously.

#### Approval of Committee Report for November 8, 2018

A motion was made, and by consensus, the report was approved.

#### Chair's Remarks

Chair Sabol Soule is delighted to be here and welcomes the full house. Responses to emails will be conducted Monday-Friday only. Emergency email responses will be handled as they occur.

#### Report of the Recreation and Special Events Director

Mr. Gruner wished everyone a Happy New Year. Recreation was very active beginning with Veteran's Day hosting Col. Patrick Byrne as a guest speaker. The monthly dinners for January are sold out. Recreation will be introducing a Parisian dinner to replace the steak dinner in January with upscale dinner events to come. The Performing Arts Center hosted James Darren on New Year's Agenda Item #4

Eve and introduced the Celebrity Series for 2019 which includes such performers as the Nelson twins and the Flamingos. The Holiday Festival was on December 2 and included the Spark of Love toy drive for the fire department. The Christmas Buffet hosted at Clubhouse 5 was well attended. Clubhouse 5 also hosted a well-attended New Year's Eve party with entertainment by Soulicious.

Facility enhancements include Clubhouse 1 testing of structural integrity and potential presence of asbestos in order to proceed with enhancements. Clubhouse 4 had OSHA compliance issues that have been corrected with the paint booth ventilation as the last to be addressed. Pool 5 is being replastered with estimated completion by end of January to early February. All pools will receive new pool furniture in 2019. The Garden Centers will have a common area introduced as plans are being finalized. All chairs at the clubhouses will be replaced. The Library received new lounge chairs.

Operational improvements include a survey conducted in conjunction with Saddleback Emeritus to better improve class needs was mailed to all residents. 500 completed surveys have been received thus far. Staff will be attending the CPRS mini-conference at the Laguna Hills Community Center on January 24. The staff manual is being reviewed for improvements.

Ms. Murphy reported that our bus excursion is full for the Hilbert Museum and the Stressless Mindfulness Meditation class is also full. The Lunar New Year celebration at the Performing Arts Center will be on Sunday, Jan 27 and is almost sold out. This event will also host a multicultural fair (11am-2pm) in addition to the evening performance which begins at 6:30 p.m. Monthly dinners are currently taking place in January. Recreation may host a Mardi Gras dinner and a new caterer may be added to the caterer list. Valentine's Day Dinner Dance will be hosted at Clubhouse 1 with Close Harmony entertaining us for \$35 (includes dinner, entertainment, beer and wine). Paint class with Penni Rubin will be hosted January 18 in the Clubhouse 6 Multipurpose Room. Cost is \$96 per person. Paint and Pour will be hosted on February 7 at Clubhouse 1. This event has sold out as well. Timeless Melodies will be at Clubhouse 2 and will feature the music of Richard Rodgers. This will be a two-part series: February 5 will feature Early Broadway and March 5 will feature Rogers and Hammerstein compilations.

Mr. McCray reported that golf is a bit quieter as the days are shorter. The range shack at the driving range is nearly complete and will assist with better customer service. Mr. McCray is meeting next week to discuss the scope of driving range landscaping improvements. A shoe fitting day by FootJoy will be hosted soon. A Nine and Wine event will be hosted one Thursday each month at the Par 3 course to encourage usage; appetizers will be provided. Short game and driving clinics will also be hosted. Pickleball and paddle tennis are coming along nicely: court primer has been applied, but five solid days of no rain will be needed to complete the court surface. The courts are scheduled to be open the first part of February. A tennis post broke due to rust and will be repaired tomorrow.

Mr. Cincotta reported the course is doing very well despite the high heat we had over the summer. An irrigation problem has been addressed. Mr. Cincotta thanked CAC and GRF for all the support his staff receives. The maintenance office building will be updated in 2019.

#### **MEMBER COMMENTS (Items Not on the Agenda)**

Members spoke on the following topics: Equestrian riding trail safety while crossing roads, physically active clubs given priority on room reservations with wood flooring which would minimize

activity on concrete flooring, staff conducting a survey to assess cost of a shade covering for pool 5, inquiry about the closure of Clubhouse 1 Main Lounge on New Year's Day, club rentals of transportation to take residents to club events, the absence of a hearing loop in Clubhouse 6 and the Clubhouse 4 sewing room inefficiencies for hosting the general election.

Chair Sabol Soule directed staff to review the equestrian trail options. Chair Sabol Soule inquired to number of line dancing reservations on a concrete floor. Mr. Gruner stated the club currently meets 15 times at the Performing Arts Center and staff is trying to find time/space accommodation. Director Milliman directed staff to pursue a sun shade option for pool 5. Mr. Gruner will reconsider keeping the Clubhouse 1 Main Lounge open on New Year's Day. Chair Sabol Soule requested staff to inquire about a hearing loop in the Board Room. Director Perak stated we may be able to revisit the usage of vans for clubs, but not available at this time. Director Skillman stated Recreation will be working with the Registrar of Voters to improve future elections.

The motion carried unanimously.







**SUBJECT: Pool 5 Shade Structure** 

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Due to cost, scope of work and lack of demand, staff does not recommend designing and building a permanent pool shade structure over Pool 5.

#### **BACKGROUND**

At the January CAC meeting the committee directed Staff to research the feasibility of designing and installing a permanent shade structure over Pool 5 per a resident's inquiry.

Currently, Pool 1 has a permanent shade structure to protect sun sensitive swimmers.

#### **DISCUSSION**

In response to this inquiry, Staff met with Shadewest, a company specializing in shade structures throughout North America, to assess the feasibility and provide cost estimates of the project.

The project would require large and deep footings to secure the structure during high winds and inclement weather. The footings would be constructed on the hillside extending over the walls of the pool and large holes drilled into the pool deck to accommodate the other support footings. Due to the large size, the shade material would be reinforced to be sun and wind resistant.

Demand for adding a second shaded pool is very low.

#### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The estimated cost to design, engineer, manage, construct and include contingencies is \$250,000, which would require a supplemental appropriation from the Facilities Fund to proceed in the current year, or inclusion in the 2020 Capital Plan.



#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends closing all Department of Recreation and Special Events facilities on Wednesday August 14, 2019 from 1 to 4 p.m. for a comprehensive training day for all departmental employees.

#### **BACKGROUND**

At the January Community Activities Committee (CAC) meeting, Staff recommended approval to close all Department of Recreation and Special Events facilities for a comprehensive training day for all Recreation employees.

The proposed comprehensive employee development and training day is new and has not been conducted in previous years. Staff development training is a best management practice in the recreation and special events field as well as for high performing corporations such as Starbucks.

#### **DISCUSSION**

Comprehensive training is critical in customer service oriented corporations. Training provides an opportunity to exchange ideas; review and/or introduce new operational procedures and enhancements; focus on team building; develop customer service skills, ensure consistent delivery; and understand the vision and objectives of the department and corporation.

Clubhouse supervisors will develop and train staff members. The training will include a corporate and departmental overview, breakout sessions focusing on customer service, operating procedures, emergency procedures, situational role playing and team building activities.

#### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

A loss of revenue from golf operations and room rentals is estimated to be \$2,700 and \$140, respectively. In addition, staff is getting paid to attend the training; those not scheduled to work that day would be asked to come in and attend, costing up to \$4,500 if every team member comes.

**SUBJECT: Drop-In Lounge Television** 

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Affirm the reinstallation of the Drop-In Lounge television with restricted programming and closed captioning to Village Television (TV6). In addition Staff recommends the purchase and installation of two secured electronic tablets that can be used for accessing other news and entertainment. Residents may use their own headphones or purchase a set for \$1. Use of the tablets is on a first come first serve basis via registration in the office. Usage time is limited to one hour if other Residents are waiting to access the tablets.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Drop-In Lounge located at Clubhouse 1 is open seven days a week from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. The Lounge is a gathering area for Residents to have a cup of coffee, socialize, work on a jigsaw puzzle, read a magazine, conduct work and/or relax.

Until December 17, 2018, a wall mounted television was present within the lounge; users had the ability to select programming and volume level.

Altercations and arguments occurred among Residents who had conflicting viewing preferences and interests resulting in Security being called to the lounge. The abusive behaviors hindered the enjoyment and necessitated the removal of the television for safety purposes on Monday, December 17, 2018.

On January 10, 2019, Staff provided an overview of the events leading to the removal of the television and options moving forward. The CAC requested Staff review and provide a recommendation on reinstalling the television without the ability for patrons to change channels and adjust volume. Further, the CAC directed Staff to explore the option of incorporating tablets for time restricted individual use.

#### DISCUSSION

Staff has received requests to reinstall the television in the Drop-In Lounge. After exploring various alternatives, the Department of Recreation and Special Events intends to purchase and install a 43" LED SMART television with programming restricted to Village Television (TV6) including limited closed captioning. Restricting channel change access would mitigate the cause of past disagreements among the Residents visiting the lounge. The safety and common interests of all Residents is the utmost priority.

Village Television (TV6) airs local origination programming seven days a week, covering community news, highlights of community events, feature stories, entertainment programs, as well as live broadcasts of homeowner's association meetings and live broadcasts of the Laguna Woods City Council meetings. Full length feature films are shown Monday and Friday at 6 p.m.

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The addition of tablets will further enhance the users experience and enjoyment of the Drop-In Lounge. In addition, users can view their own programing without disrupting others providing a safer environment. Residents may use their own headphones or purchase a set for \$1. Use of the tablets is on a first come first serve basis via office registration. Usage time is limited to one hour if other Residents are waiting to access the tablets.

#### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Installation of a 43" wall mounted television will cost approximately \$330 with minimal staff time. The purchase of two iPad Pro tablets with secured kiosk will cost approximately \$1,740. Headphones will be available for purchase for \$1.

**SUBJECT: Tree Plot Fee Increase** 

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Review and approve raising the annual tree plot rental fee from \$30 to \$50 per year, to offset operating costs associated with maintaining trees at Garden Centers 1 and 2; and revise Garden Center Rental Pricing Resolution 90-13-01 from a 90 percent to a 84 percent community shared percentage.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Garden Centers have 257 tree plots, generating annual revenue of approximately \$7,710 from rental fees. Approximately 125 large trees are estimated to be over 15 feet tall. Tree plot lessees cannot maintain and prune these large trees causing them to overgrow, become unhealthy, and create a potentially hazardous environment.

On January 3, 2013 the GRF Board adopted a 90 percent community shared policy and resolution, 90-13-01.

#### **DISCUSSION**

A tree trimming service could be contracted to trim and prune all trees over 15 feet at the garden centers. Trees would be assessed annually to ensure they are maintained and properly cared for on a consistent basis.

#### **FINANCIAL ANALYSIS**

Tree rental fees would be the same as the garden plot fees; offsetting the community cost of maintaining the trees that benefit the tree plot lessee. Additional revenue generated from the annual fee increase is \$5,140; total annual revenue would be \$12,850.

Staff estimates the trimming cost ranges from \$50 for a small tree under 10 feet tall to \$300 for a large tree over 30 feet tall. There are approximately 125 trees between 15 and 30 feet in height. Average cost is estimated at \$150 per tree. The first year total cost for all large trees would be \$18,750.

Once trimmed, the cost drops significantly as there is less maintenance in future years; the smaller trees would be maintained the second year; alternating each year between the large and smaller trees. Fees would have to be re-evaluated after the first year.

#### **ENDORSEMENT** (to GRF Finance and GRF)

#### **Recommendation to Approve Garden Center Rental Pricing Policy**

A motion was made by Director Feeney and seconded by Director Welch to move forward with the draft of the September 2011 GRF Resolution regarding Garden Center rental pricing policy (70% shared by the Community across the board). The motion was amended by Director Welch for a 70% shared percentage by the Community for all Garden Center rental fees except tree plots and those to be shared at 90%. Members unanimously voted in favor of the amendment and the original motion as amended.

A motion was made by Director Welch, seconded by Director Beldner, and carried unanimously to change the rototilling and plot clean up fees to chargeable services.

#### **RESOLUTION 90-13-01**

**WHEREAS**, according to Resolution 90-12-132, which established guidelines for shared costs and fees, certain fees can be imposed upon users of various recreational facilities in order to control crowding and minimize over-usage, and to recover operating costs; and

**WHEREAS**, by way of Resolution 90-06-32, the Board of Directors adopted a Resident Division Fee Schedule which lists fees charged to residents and non-residents to use GRF shared facilities;

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, January 4, 2013, that the Board of Directors of the Corporation hereby adopts the GRF Pricing policy relative to Garden Center Fees:

#### Garden Center Rental Pricing Policy

- A Garden Plot Rental Fee shall be charged, annually, for each type of plot (Vegetable Plot, Tree Plot, and Shade House Plot)
- The Garden Plot Rental Fee, rounded up to the nearest dollar, shall be based on the estimated annual per square foot cost of the facility applied to the maximum square feet per size category of Vegetable plots and the average square feet for Tree and Shade House plots; and will be adjusted annually on the basis of annual operational costs, capital costs, and the percentage(s) shared (subsidized) by the community at large as illustrated in the table below:

Plot Type	Percentage Shared by the Community*
Vegetable Plots, 0-200 Sq.Ft.	70
Vegetable Plots, 201-400 Sq.Ft.	70
Vegetable Plots, 401-600 Sq.Ft.	70
Tree Plots	90
Shade House Plots	70

\*Per Resolution G-89-115, Guidelines for Shared Costs & Fees, 1% to 99%

 The GRF Board of Directors will periodically review the estimated annual cost of each plot type and determine what shared percentage to apply in order to maintain an equitable and reasonable division between the user and the monthly assessment (per Resolution 90-12-132, Guidelines for Shared Costs and Fees)

**RESOLVED FURTHER,** that rototilling and plot clean-up services will become a chargeable services and shall be removed from the Fee Schedule; and

**RESOLVED FURTHER**, that Resolution 90-06-32 adopted May 2, 2006 is hereby amended (Resident Division Fee Schedule); and

**RESOLVED FURTHER**, that the officers and agents of this Corporation are hereby authorized on behalf of the Corporation to carry out the purpose of this resolution.
