SUBJECT: Irrigation Status Report

RECOMMENDATION

Receive and file this report.

BACKGROUND

Water usage and charges for April through September, typically the months with the highest water demand, are provided to the Committee each meeting showing trends from 2015 to present.

DISCUSSION

Water use data collected for April 2015 through September 2018 documents that with the exception of June and July of this year, the overall water consumption decreased in 2018 compared to 2017 for the period. September 2018 reflects a significant decrease in usage from August 2018 for Irrigation and Mixed Consumption. See Attachment 1.

There was no rainfall in June through September 2018. The evapotranspiration (ET) rates increased for these months compared to 2017; meaning that the plants' demand for water was higher. See Attachment 2. September 2018 ET is lower than August but higher than September 2017. The Village computer controlled irrigation systems use ET to determine the optimum amount to irrigate by calculating the loss of moisture in the soil through evaporation and plant transpiration. These high ET values reflect the high temperatures that were experienced on several days during this time period. Therefore, with the total decrease in water usage from April to September 2018 is most likely a result of less water being used by residents.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Overall, the water use for 2018 is less than 2017, which has resulted in budgetary savings. With the weather cooling and the growing season ending, it is anticipated that the savings will continue to the end of the year.





ATT-2: April – September Rainfall and Evapotranspiration Trends









It's a sunny day and the crop is absorbing available soil water from the root zone (root depth). As a result of humidity and temperature, water transpires through the leaves and evaporates from the soil into the atmosphere. This process is called EvapoTranspiration. When it rains, with low humidity and temperature, this process does not occur.

SUBJECT: Herbicide Trial Results

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. Direct staff to eliminate of the use of Roundup and other herbicides containing the active ingredient glyphosate in landscaped areas with United Mutual and to utilize only organic herbicides for the control of weeds.
- 2. Approve a supplemental appropriation of \$405,000, to be funded from the Contingency Fund, to maintain the current level of landscape weed management in 2019 and direct staff to include sufficient funding in future business plans for this alternative.

BACKGROUND

The Landscape Division has utilized Roundup and other herbicides containing the active ingredient glyphosate to manage landscape weeds for many years. The annual budget includes approximately \$185,000 for labor and materials related to the application of postemergent herbicides (Roundup). At the Landscape Committee meeting of June 14, 2018, residents of United Mutual requested that the Committee consider the elimination of the use of those products due to potential adverse health effects to the residents and their pets.

At a Special Meeting of the Landscape Committee, held on July 19, 2018, the Committee directed staff to test various organic herbicides to determine if there were effective alternatives to the use of 'Roundup' and return to the Committee in December 2018 to report the results. Staff obtained information on products that were already being utilized by the City of Irvine through Non-toxic Neighborhoods to guide the purchase and mixing dilutions of several organic herbicide products. Products were obtained and field staff were trained according to state regulations. On September 14, 2018, staff initiated the testing of organic and non-glyphosate containing herbicides.

DISCUSSION

The test sites were based on approximately 20,000 square feet of turf and shrub bed areas. Staff selected Suppress Herbicide EC and Finale Herbicide as they are rated to have the best results for weed control. Liberate (penetrant) or Oroboost (spray adjuvant) were used with the herbicides to assist the chemicals in penetrating the weeds and to prevent the chemicals from washing off of the plant surface. Suppress and Liberate/Oroboost were tested on landscapes surrounding Buildings 241-247. Finale and Liberate were similarly applied around Buildings 763-773.

The effectiveness of these organic herbicides was compared to areas where Roundup was applied around Buildings 233-240 and 757-762. See Attachment 1. After three applications, staff observed that Finale/Liberate worked very well as an alternative for Roundup. With

Suppress, staff replaced Liberate with Oroboost to improve performance during the test period and observed a noticeable improvement.

Overall, Staff observed that the organic herbicides tested, while generally less effective than Roundup in completely killing weeds, were found to be satisfactory in providing the necessary control of most landscape weeds and to a lesser degree for edging turf. During the test period additional information was received from the City of Irvine on additional effective herbicides and tank mixes of multiple organic herbicides that have proven to be even more effective. Detailed information on adjusting the pH of the water and frequently testing the final product prior to application was also suggested by the city representative. To preserve the integrity of the testing in United Mutual, these additional products and tank mixes were not utilized. However, they appear to be very promising and are being implemented by staff at this time.

The elimination of Roundup and glyphosate products from the landscape maintenance program and instead utilizing organic-based herbicides was proven to be a viable alternative. The negative aspects discovered in the testing were the higher costs attributed to the hours and required to provide more frequent application of organic herbicides and the higher material cost to generate effective spray mixes.

A cost comparison of the use of the organic herbicides to Roundup was conducted for the three applications (see Attachment 2). Both of the organic herbicides tested must be applied four times for every one application of Roundup to obtain satisfactory control of weeds or turf edges. As a result of the testing, staff determined that the herbicide Finale as the most effective herbicide, but the most costly. Future use of other products and tank mixtures may yield improved results and possibly more cost effective solutions.

Staff supports the implementation of the organic herbicides into the grounds maintenance program, but the impact of the labor necessary for the multiple applications and the high material cost for the products must be addressed. The total program cost is estimated at \$590,000 annually.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Additional funding of approximately \$405,000 per year would be needed to maintain existing services levels as it relates to the control of landscape weeds in United Mutual using one of the organic herbicides tested. This estimate could be reduced if more cost effective organic herbicides are identified and utilized.



SUBJECT: Request for Tree Removal by Farokhi (723-C) – Carrotwood Tree

RECOMMENDATION

Deny the request for the removal of one Carrotwood tree located at 723-C and trim onschedule in December 2018.

BACKGROUND

Mr. Farokhi purchased the manor in October 2010. He is requesting the removal of a Carrotwood tree, *Cupaniopsis anacardioides* located at the front of his manor in the planter area. See Attachment 1. The reasons cited by him for the removal are: structural damage, overgrown, litter/debris and that Ms. Farokhi fell due to debris, resulting in the need for medical attention. Three additional residents signed the request, one in favor of the removal and two against. See Attachment 2.

The tree was last trimmed in November 2015 and is scheduled for pruning again in approximately December 2018. The tree is approximately 29 feet in height with a trunk diameter of approximately 12 inches. It is growing approximately six to eight feet from the enclosed patio and approximately three feet from the walkway.

DISCUSSION

At the time of inspection the tree was found to be in good condition with no visible decay, pests or trunk damage. There is some noticeable cracking in the concrete walkway and in the enclosed patio slab; with no noticeable damage to the patio wall. The cracked sidewalk concrete does not appear to be as the result of roots from the tree. Although the Carrotwood tree drops leaves, fruit and other debris, United Mutual tree removal policies do not support the removal of a tree based on litter/debris.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS


The cost to remove the tree is estimated to be \$900. The cost to trim the tree is estimated to be \$300 with an estimated value of \$2,693 based on ArborPro tree inventory.



SUBJECT: Request for Tree Removal by Russo (684-C) – Jacaranda Tree

RECOMMENDATION

Deny the request for the removal of one Jacaranda tree located at 684-C and trim onschedule.

BACKGROUND

Mr. Russo purchased the manor in December 2007. He is requesting the removal of a Jacaranda Tree, *Jacaranda mimosifolia*, located at the side of his manor in the lawn area. See Attachment 1. The reasons cited by him for the removal are: structural damage, sewer damage and overgrown. Two additional residents have signed in favor of the removal. See Attachment 2.

The tree was last trimmed in August 2016 and is scheduled for pruning again in approximately August 2019. The tree is approximately 32 feet in height with a trunk diameter of approximately 15 inches and is growing approximately three feet from the walkway (an alteration) and approximately six to eight feet from the common walkway and approximately 12-15 feet from the manors.

DISCUSSION

At the time of inspection, the tree was found to be in good condition with no visible decay, pests or trunk damage. There is some noticeable surface rooting which may have caused the alteration sidewalk to lift. The tree has a balanced canopy and is well placed. There have been numerous plumbing tickets in the past, including mainline and single fixture stoppages none of which have been associated with roots being present. There is currently a pending ticket for an emergency waste line repair noting a crack in the sewer line. No information has been received that would indicate that roots from this tree are the cause of that condition.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The cost to remove the tree is estimated to be \$1,200. The cost to trim the tree is estimated to be \$300; with an estimated value of \$3,364, based on ArborPro tree inventory.



SUBJECT: Request for Tree Removal by Guthrie (850-P) – Red Iron Bark Tree

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the request for the removal of one Red Iron Bark tree located at 850-P and schedule the work to be performed in the next 90 days.

BACKGROUND

Mr. Guthrie purchased the manor in April 2004. He is requesting the removal of a Red Iron Bark tree, *Eucalyptus sideroxylon*, located at the side of his manor in the slope area. See Attachment 1. The reasons cited by him for the removal are: litter/debris, overgrown, poor condition and diseased. See Attachment 2.

The tree was last trimmed in November 2016 and is scheduled for pruning again in approximately November 2019. The tree is approximately 62 feet in height with a trunk diameter of approximately 38 inches and is growing approximately four to five feet from the building.

DISCUSSION

At the time of inspection the tree was found to be in poor condition with visible decay and trunk damage. The tree has sap weeping from the trunk and branches, likely caused by boring insects. The tree has been topped in the past, which has resulted in poorly attached new branches, as well as the development of water sprouting growth. Due to the decay present and potential for branch and limb failure, staff is recommending the removal of this tree.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The cost to remove the tree is estimated to be \$1,500.





SUBJECT: Request for Tree Removal by Carlson (303-A) – Carrotwood tree located at

303-B

RECOMMENDATION

Deny the request for the removal of one Carrotwood tree located at 303-B and trim within 30 days as a street light clearance.

BACKGROUND

Ms. Carlson purchased the manor in October 2012. She is requesting the removal of a Carrotwood tree, *Cupaniopsis anacardioides*, located at the front of the manor in the lawn area. See Attachment 1. The reasons cited by her for the removal are: litter/debris and street light blockage. Three additional residents have signed in favor of the removal including Ms. Nee at 303-B, which is where the tree is located. See Attachment 2.

The tree was last trimmed in December 2015 and is scheduled for trimming again in approximately January 2019. The tree is approximately 25 feet in height with a trunk diameter of approximately 16 inches and is growing approximately six to eight feet from the walkways.

DISCUSSION

At the time of inspection, the tree was found to be in good condition with no visible decay, pests or trunk damage. There is minimal surface rooting with some cracking in the sidewalk with evidence of previous concrete grinding. There is a conflict with a streetlight. This tree will be placed on a annual trim cycle for streetlight clearance.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The cost to remove the tree is estimated at \$900. The cost to trim is estimated to be \$300, with an estimated value of \$3,621 based on ArborPro tree inventory.
